About This Lesson

Activity 1 - Mission: School Subjects

Direct students to complete **Mission: School Subjects**, where they will explore how they can use school subjects outside of school.

In-Real-Life Mission: Teach a Topic!

In this extension activity, students teach something new to someone they know. They can use the handout to record their findings, or create a video, audio recording, or photo collage of their mission. They then upload the artifact to **Storyboard**, and reflect on what they learned.

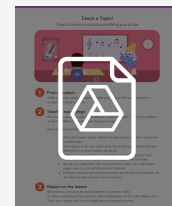

Find a student

Invite a friend or family member to take your lesson. Pick someone who is curious and loves to learn!

Teach 5 new things

Pick a topic you know lots about and are excited to share. Teach your student at least 5 different facts or ideas about your topic.

Here are some teaching tips:

- Plan your lesson ahead of time. Decide what you want to teach and in what order.
- Pick a place to be your classroom. Try to find somewhere with few distractions so your student can focus.
- Gather or create anything you'll need to help explain your topic. These could include worksheets, posters, pictures, or books.
- Set up your classroom with any tools you'll need. You might want paper, pencils, or a whiteboard and markers.
- End your class by quizzing your student about what they learned. Or ask them to write a story or draw a picture.

Encuentra un alumno

Invita a un amigo o miembro de la familia a tu lección. Elige a alguien que tenga curiosidad y adore aprender.

Enseña 5 cosas nuevas

Elige un tema del que tengas mucho conocimiento y que estés entusiasmado por compartir. Enseña a tu alumno al menos 5 aspectos o ideas diferentes sobre tu tema.

A continuación, se ofrecen algunos consejos para la enseñanza:

- Planifica tu lección con anticipación. Decide lo que deseas enseñar y el orden en que deseas hacerlo.
- Elige un lugar para tu aula. Intenta encontrar un lugar en el que haya pocas distracciones para que tu alumno pueda concentrarse.
- Reúne o crea los materiales que necesites para ayudar a explicar tu tema. Entre estos podrían incluirse hojas de trabajo, pósteres, imágenes o libros.
- Prepara tu aula con las herramientas que necesitarás. Es posible que necesites papel, lápices o un pizarrón blanco y marcadores.
- Termina la clase haciendo preguntas a tus estudiantes sobre lo que aprendieron. También puedes pedirles que escriban una historia o hagan un dibujo.
